Provisional title for project:

One year one, the impact of body worn video cameras on criminal justice outcomes for violent incidents in London.

100 word abstract of what the project would probably undertake, and any data to be used

The College of Policing undertook a randomised controlled trial. Violent incidents attended by treatment group officers wearing BWV were compared with violent incidents attended by control group officers not wearing BWV to measure any difference in related arrest, charge and convictions. The trial was 12 months long, so further analysis is desired to test the impact now there has been more time for cases to have progressed through the criminal justice system, particularly whether BWV footage increases the number of early guilty pleas and alters sentencing. Data from the Metropolitan police and Ministry of Justice would be provided.
