### Progress/Updates:

• Manchester 2020

As you will now be aware, the University is to commence consultation with the Trade Unions in relation to reductions of up to 75 posts across AMBS and SALC in order to deliver our M2020 strategy, secure future financial sustainability and allow strategic investment in priority areas.

Colleagues in areas affected by these proposed changes are now receiving more detailed information and have attended staff meetings to outline the next steps for them. We understand that this is a difficult and anxious time for these colleagues and the University is taking steps to support those affected. ### • Cyber security roadshows

Ahead of the new two-step login process for all staff being launched in the summer, there are a number of free events taking place across the University to highlight the risks we face and how to work more safely.

Local experts from the Greater Manchester Police Cyber Crime Team, TITAN (the North West Regional Organised Crime Unit) and Professor Daniel Dresner, from the School of Computer Science, will be sharing their insights into the underworld of cybercrime, its victims and first hand advice on staying safe. ## • Staff survey: next steps

Across the University, 72% of staff responded to the Staff Survey 2017 providing their feedback on what it is like to work here. Our Faculty's response rate of 68% was the highest response rate of the three Faculties. Thank you to everyone who has taken part. Your feedback provides us with a really good insight into how staff are feeling right now and it helps senior leaders develop new action plans at each level. The University level results will be communicated to all staff in mid-June, followed by the Faculty, School and Faculty Office level results later in the month. Work will then begin on developing action plans at University, Faculty, School and Faculty Office levels, responding to some of the key areas of concern.

# • Course recognised in the Good Teacher Training Guide 2017

The University of Manchester Primary Initial Teacher Education course has been ranked as the second highest university in England in the Good Teacher Training Guide 2017. The annual guide ranks teacher training providers based on trainee entry qualifications, Ofsted performance and completion of their training linked to employment. Overall The University of Manchester combined primary and secondary provision came seventh in the league table of universities and was once again the highest performing university in the North of England.

# Policy and planning:

• RCUK General Election purdah guidance for publicising funded research

As non-departmental public bodies the Research Councils are bound by purdah during a pre-election period. This period commences when parliament is dissolved and ends when a new government is formed (not when the polls close). During this time RCUK is unable to engage in any activities that might in any way influence the outcome of the election and must avoid competition with parliamentary candidates for the attention of the public.

The period of sensitivity is from midnight (the evening) 21 April 2017 until at least 9 June 2017. Purdah will only end when a new government is formed, which may take additional time after polls close in the event of a hung parliament.

Notably during this period we (research organisations) must ensure that we -

- Avoid issuing press releases about new research during this period and or check with communications and marketing staff first;
- Do not attribute research to RCUK unless in response to a specific enquiry as to the source of your funding;
- Do not publish anything that has the potential to influence the outcome of the election;
- Ensure posts to websites and social media platforms are done with due care and attention to the principles above.
