### The Economic Problem for the Regions

Post-war settlement upset by non-Western competition: economic dominance eroded

### Free movement of capital:

- National capital controls (1970s)
- Big Bang bank deregulation & Glass-Steagall repeal (1980s/1990s)
- China opens for investment (1991)
- Single European Market (1992)

### Free movement of labour (EU)



## Fundamentally re-wrote relationship between capital and labour

### The Economic Problem for the Regions

A class of people that is fundamentally *economically obsolete* – in Western Europe and under current economic paradigm, concentrated in the post-industrial regions, which are now 'outside the policy tent'

### The Economic Problem for Devolution

All of this *is* related to the spatial scale at which decisions are taken

Hence changing that scale has the potential to alter fundamental economic conditions in poorer places...

But simply moving economic policy (very partially) closer to the people is wholly insufficient

Paradigm shift is also required: but probably still not enough

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#### Wales economy: Carwyn Jones's foreign investment and trade call

Putting Wales on the world map is vital if the nation is to compete in the world economy, says First Minister Carwyn Jones.

Mr Jones spoke as he met business leaders and trade unions in Cardiff.

He said attracting foreign investment and encouraging international trade was the way forward for Wales.

Lord Heseltine, who is leading a review into whether government departments are helping the economy grow, attended the meeting.

In his first press briefing following the summer recess, Mr Jones said: "The figures for foreign direct investment are improving. They improved in 2011 from 2010.

### Story so far

Economic policy post-devolution (inc. London) remains neo-liberal, largely a-spatial, individually-oriented. i.e. Thatcherite. Really seems to be TINA

Place-based policies demoted to 'regeneration': divorced from economic policy, ameliorative & faffing with physical infrastructure to very limited effect

Deviation from UK-National approach minimal. Why?

### Barriers (1) Structures

Key economic levers – cost of capital, exchange rate, labour market structures: & critically economic regulation remain at UK level (to benefit of SE)

Meanwhile radical public sector intervention – procurement, capital ownership, local orientations – forbidden or complicated by 'competitive' EU Directives & policies

& meanwhile UK & EU drip the methadone: benefits, pensions, ERDF, CAP...

### Barriers (2) Incentives

Devo has interacted with UK party politics to lessen space for innovative economic policy – even (especially?) in Scotland

Has also invented a new layer of rent-seeking, centralising & centralised bureaucrats with nothing to gain from risk taking and all to gain from *status quo* 

Perversely, 'legitimacy' of Cardiff Bay & Holyrood probably weakened voices & importance Local Govt & community

Regional Government: *Top* of region or *bottom* of neoliberal state?

### Conclusions

Devolution in UK is misnamed: so far has been regionalisation

Unclear whether capacity or appetite exists in empowered regions to innovate & challenge – especially where Devo or £ is in gift of London (M4, City Deals, Mayors...). EU probably makes this worse. At end of the day local people still do not control local resources... and this is the key issue
