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
Directions

Day 1, 25 November: Harwood Room, Barnes Wallis Building

The Barnes Wallis Building is located on Altrincham Street (a pedestrian walkway – keep to the upper level) which is parallel to the railway viaduct. You will see a large red sculpture of a magnet and the conference entrance to the Harwood Room is located just next to this. The registration desk will be at the foot of the stairs opposite the entrance.

The venue is within easy walking distance of both Oxford Rd and Piccadilly train stations. The 147 Oxford Rd link bus runs from south campus on Oxford Rd – delegates should get off at the Sackville Street stop (free for staff and students showing their card, 50p for other users). The closest car-park is on Charles Street.

Delegates can purchase lunch in the Senior Common Room on the 2nd floor of the adjacent Staff House Building (indoor connection from Harwood Room)



Day 2, 26 November: Room C014, Sackville Street Building

See map above – the Sackville Street Building is highlighted in blue and is bordered by Sackville St to the west, Granby Row to the south, and Whitworth Street to the north.

Enter the Sackville Street Building via the main entrance on Sackville Street. Go up the carpeted stairs and turn left through the doors at the top. Turn left and go up the first flight of stairs to C floor. Turn right and you will see C014 dwon the corridor on your left (we will make sure there is plenty of directional signage too)

The venue is within easy walking distance of both Oxford Rd and Piccadilly train stations. The 147 Oxford Rd link bus runs from south campus on Oxford Rd – delegates should get off at the Sackville Street stop (free for staff and students showing their card, 50p for other users). The closest car-park is on Charles Street.
