Introduction

As the proportion of the world's population living in urban areas continues to grow, so do the obstacles to securing an inclusive, just and sustainable set of futures. Cities and their surrounding areas in the global north and the global south face a host of challenges. These include civil unrest, climate change, education delivery, energy provision, governance, housing shortages, infrastructure investment, and poverty. Cities, though, are also home to significant innovation involving co-production, creative

design, DIY-politics, participatory governance and social cohesion. These challenges are not only practical. They also ask questions of the academic field of urban studies, which is undergoing something of a renaissance as cities have become the centre of debates both in the global north and the global south.

Early 2017 will see the launch of the Manchester Urban Institute (MUI), a new University of Manchester flagship research institute that will build upon the work of cities@ manchester and unites the strengths of a number of long-standing research centres. MUI will draw together academics, graduate students and researchers from anthropology, architecture, business studies, development studies, education, engineering, geography, gerontology, history, medical sciences, planning, political science and sociology through its work on four cross-cutting, inter-disciplinary themes.

(This theme houses the Economic and Social Research Council (ESRC) Impact Acceleration Account (IAA) funded Devo Manc Hub and the ESRC-funded Jam and Justice project)
