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THE UK CONTEXT: MORE WORK, AND MORE 'ATYPICAL' WORK

For many people in the UK the last couple of years have been a good time to find work



Unemployment and employment rate: UK



But as well as increased employment, there has also been a marked increase in 'atypical' work







EMPLOYMENT IN GREATER MANCHESTER

Some similarities, some differences

Employment has grown strongly since 2013, but not as dramatically as in London



Employment rate (16 - 64) (Annual rolling average)



Notes: 'Metro counties' are Merseyside, West Midlands, Tyneside, South Yorkshire, and West Yorkshire

And with this growth there has been a rise in 'atypical' work

THE PAY SQUEEZE IN GREATER MANCHESTER

The pay squeeze has bitten harder in Greater Manchester, particularly for men.

While men have felt the squeeze, female earnings have been somewhat protected by NLW

And the NLW will come to play an even more important role in Greater Manchester over the next few years

Share of people on low-pay and on the minimum wage in Greater Manchester



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- Greater Manchester performed relatively well in terms of employment in 2000s, less so since the crisis
- Like the rest of the UK, 'atypical' work has grown in the region
- Greater Manchester has experienced a sharp pay squeeze, which has particularly affected men
- Changes to the occupational structure and the NLW will continue to have a pronounced impact, particularly on younger workers
