

BSocSc Politics and International Relations

What you will study

This document gives you a flavour of what you might study as part of the Politics and International Relations course at Manchester.

Each year of your degree you need to take units that add up to 120 credits.

Each unit is made up of 10 or 20 credits. This reflects the amount of work involved, so for every one credit you should do approximately 10 hours of work (eg lectures, tutorials, office hours and independent study).

Each of the course units below has **pre-requisites – other course units which you need to have taken the year before**. You can find information about these by clicking on the particular course unit information pages.

The actual units taught will depend on the availability of staff.

Year 1

In your first year you will take 120 units overall.

You will take 4 compulsory courses which make up two thirds of your first year (80 credits) and cover the three main areas of Politics that we teach at Manchester. They are as follows.

You will then take another 40 credits which can include the following Politics courses:

You can also choose units from outside politics, including economics, history, languages and other social sciences such as philosophy or sociology.

Year 2

The second year of your course you will again cover the three areas of international relations, comparative politics and political theory with 120 credits of courses overall.

You have to take two compulsory course units:

As part of the 120 units in your second year you can choose to take up to 20 credits that are not part of your second year options.

Year 3

In your final year you will need to take 120 credits overall. This would include a compulsory dissertation and a flexible choice of Politics course units.
