Provisional title for project: Pathways and destinations of children in

need

100 word abstract of what the project would probably undertake, and any data to be used:

The Department conducts an annual census of children in need of local authority social care services. In 2015 around 635,000 children were referred for support. The annual datasets have recently been matched to produce a longitudinal dataset.

The aim of this project is to undertake an analysis of the trajectories and destinations of children that have engaged with the service. This will include looking at: movements in, out and back into the service; from less to more intensive levels of support; and the impact of support received. A presentation and report of the analysis will be provided for DfE policy colleagues.

Child safeguarding, children in need, children looked after, child protection, data analysis, civil service.

Essential and desirable skills that the student would need to have:

Essential:

Good quantitative and software skills (SQL plus one of SPSS or R) gained from analysis of administrative data. Strong problem solving skills. Good communication skills (oral and written).

Desirable:

Experience in presenting complex data visually

Where the work would be carried out:

London, Sheffield, Darlington, Nottingham or Manchester. The team managing this work is located in London and Sheffield.

Preferred selection method (interview or other meeting):

Interview

Opportunity to gain experience of what it is like to work in the Civil Service in an analytical role.
