## The Researcher Development Framework & eProg

### The Researcher Development Framework (RDF)

The Researcher Development Framework (RDF) is a professional development tool, created by Vitae, to help researchers at all stages of their careers to understand the knowledge, attributes and behaviours required to succeed as a professional researcher in Higher Education or beyond. Empirical data, collected from interviews with researchers, underpins the RDF, and it therefore offers a real insight into what professional research career. A full outline of the RDF "wheel" is available on pages 6 & 7 of this brochure—the wheel gives a comprehensive overview of the four domains and twelve sub-domains outlined in the RDF as well as the knowledge, attributes and behaviours required of successful researchers.

eProg is an online research progression tool and researcher development workshop catalogue for Post-graduate researchers. eProg can be used to record all training and development activity and it also forms the central booking system for researcher training courses and workshops throughout the Faculty. ## Approaching Training Strategically

### **Building a Training Plan - Thesis as a Product & Process**

An effective training & development plan will enable researchers to: (1) develop the appropriate knowledge and expertise to complete the thesis as a product of their research and (2) develop as a research professional with the necessary skills, attitudes and experience to succeed as a researcher within the field of Higher Education and beyond. The Humanities Faculty as a whole offers three types of training and development opportunity. A programme incorporating all three will enable researchers to develop the skills and knowledge to succeed:

**Discipline-specific** training will often be undertaken individually or amongst a small group of researchers who share similar research interests or supervisors. This training is specialist and is crucial to the development of the thesis as a product.

**Methodological/theoretical** training is offered via the **meth-ods@manchester** and **artsmethods@manchester** programmes (please see page 9). It unites researchers in an interdisciplinary environment to discuss a particular methodological or theoretical approach.

**Process-orientated training** is offered via the **Researcher Development Programme**. Researchers meet in an interdisciplinary environment to explore the process of undertaking a research degree. This includes planning research, writing a literature review, presenting at academic conferences and publishing in journals. The focus of this programme is on helping the researcher develop as a professional within Higher Education.

**New for 2014/15: Building Research Communities events** which support researchers to network and build collaborations across disciplinary boundaries.

# **Training & Reflective Practice**

### What constitutes training?

Professional development for research can take a variety of forms. Researcher development activities can include (but are not limited to) attendance and participation in workshops provided by methods@manchester, artsmethods@manchester and the Researcher Development Programme, self-directed reading, discussion with peers, attendance and participation at conferences, supervision meetings, review panels, participation in reading groups, participation in researcher-led initiatives and engaging in self-reflection.

### **Reflective Practice**

Becoming a reflective practitioner is an important part of the research process. Indeed, the viva itself could be seen as a reflective event. It is crucial that researchers approach their training strategically in order to achieve an appropriate balance between the development of the thesis and the gaining of appropriate and useful research skills and knowledge. At the beginning of the PhD programme, researchers should identify their training needs and develop a training plan, in consultation with their supervisor(s). The training plan should be updated at the beginning of every academic year and provides a record and a framework for discussing and documenting progress.

Researchers are also actively encouraged to keep a research diary or a blog. Reflecting on the PhD experience helps researchers to record their progress and develop a greater awareness of knowledge and expertise. Research diaries allow space for assessment of strengths and successes as well as enabling researchers to identify any weak areas and make steps to manage these, and perhaps overcome them completely.
