Local communities are the driving force behind Community Forests and they all reflect local needs and ambitions."

- ✓ The cooling impact of woodland is likely to become an increasingly important factor as a result of global climate change.



Wigan's Greenheart

Urban street tree planting Green Streets

The Green Streets project helps local communities in Manchester, Salford and Trafford to green their neighbourhoods by planting street trees, making hanging baskets, filling planters with flowers, creating community gardens or establishing environmental art works.















Green Streets:

Green Streets works closely with residents, helping them to design their scheme, find appropriate funding, consult their neighbours and maintain the planting.

Supporting education and healthy living

Health Walks; Forest Fever; Green Streets and Community Orchards, for local people to collect free fruit during harvest time. As well as apple trees there are pear trees, redcurrant bushes, damsons, blackberries, plums and hazelnuts growing for the benefit of local people.


