

Sustainable living experiments and the costliness of involvement **Nortie**

Noortje Marres

This paper discusses how experiments with sustainable living provide occasions for the definition of public engagement in socio-material terms. Analysing attempts to introduce CO2 in everyday life as a unit of measurement, it explores how such initiatives deploy domestic devices and settings as tools of involvement, and end up challenging ideals of "involvement made easy."

Noortje Marres is a Research Fellow at the James Martin Institute, University of Oxford. She has a background in science and technology studies, and received her PhD from the Philosophy Department of the University of Amsterdam, for a thesis on (neo-)pragmatist theories of democracy in a technological society.
