Entry requirement LLM/MA:	Upper second class (2:1) honours degree or the overseas equivalent in a relevant discipline (e.g. medicine, law, philosophy, nursing, religious studies). Candidates without a first degree may register initially for the PG Diploma or Certificate and will be considered for transfer to the LLM or MA.		
Entry requirement Postgraduate Diploma or Certificate:	Candidates will be accepted upon demonstrating relevant skills and attributes in this area to be decided by the Programme Director. Thus a first degree is not always necessary but a 2:2 in a first degree is an advantage.		
English language requirements:	All applicants must be proficient in the use of the English language. Where English is not your first language we require: 7.0 IELTS with a minimum writing score of 7, or an equivalent score in the IBT- TOEFL, PEARSON, or Cambridge CAE.		
What opportunities will this course lead to?	Students completing our courses do so for many reasons. A number join the MA after their first degree in a whole range of subjects. Many are mid-career healthcare professionals and lawyers who wish to explore ethical and legal issues they have encountered in the course of their work. This course will help them to do this and perhaps guide others. Some students see the MA as a way of changing their career to pursue a career in ethics and law, perhaps continuing to a PhD in this area. Several of the Centre staff started their academic careers this way. 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Are these courses suitable for me even though I have not studied ethics or law before?	Many of the students we have on these courses will not have previously studied ethics or law, or both. They are designed so that you do not need any prior knowledge or experience in these areas.		
I do not live in England. Will I learn about the relevant law applicable in the country in which I live? Are there any funding opportunities?	we have introduced a new core course unit, International Issues in Healthcare Law and Ethics. This involves consideration of both national laws and broader international regulation. Topics considered include the regulation of biotechnology and surrogacy. If you would like more information about this aspect of the courses do contact us.	The course is based on English law. Sometimes other jurisdictions are referred to, particularly those which have a similar common law system to that used in England (e.g., Australia, Canada, New Zealand). While, the emphasis is currently on English law we are working to develop a new course unit on <i>International issues in Healthcare Law and Ethics</i> along similar lines to the distance learning course now available.
