It lists the various modules (courses) which you must or may take. It lists other programme specific information, and—very importantly—provides you with the important rules and regulations which govern your studies.

Likewise, each of your instructors will provide a course handbook which gives course unit specific information, such as readings, lecture and seminar topics, and course requirements. Please read these carefully as well. And if you have any questions, or if something is not clear, please ask. We are all here to help.

Finally, in addition to being the home of a world-class university, Manchester is a world-class city. It is a fantastic place in which to live. There are numerous cultural opportunities at your doorstep. (For instance, the newly renovated Whitworth Art Gallery is only a 10-minute walk down Oxford Road from the School, and the Manchester Museum is across the street. Admission to both is free, by the way.) Take advantage of these and other opportunities. Education is not just about books; nor are educational opportunities found exclusively inside the walls of university buildings.

It is my role, as the Director of Postgraduate Taught Programmes, to ensure that a culture of quality learning and teaching exists in the Law School. Given the calibre of our academic and support staff, this part of my job is easy. But the Law School will not rest on its laurels; we will continue to improve on our excellence to ensure that you will be provided with a world-class education.
