Lesbians and gay men say having a civil partnership is like coming out to your parents all over again, a recent study has found. The University of Manchester research was carried

out by interviewing 60 lessians and 31 gay men from Manchester and the surrounding areas who are either planning or have had a civil partnership. It found some interviewees felt that telling their parents they were going to be married was as nerveracking and scary as the moment they first came out. researchers found that the majority of same-sex cou-ples received positive approval from family members but some did find themselves confronted by prob-lems, such as coming out.

Professor Carol Smart, who led the research said:
"It is not that their parents don't know about their sevality but they have shelved it as an issue and more or less ignore it. So when their grown-up children said they were going to have a civil partnership, it brought it up again

explained. For others, it was merely embarrassing. Smart added: "Parents worrythat more people will be told and it's harder to keep it from Aunty Mable." As a result, less than half of the interviewees intend-

As a result, less mannar or the interviewees mended to invite both their parents. Some don't even tell them they are getting hitched.

Smart said: "Inviting parents was often a thorny issue. Some people did say they delayed having ceremony until their parents died.
"But we got a lot of heartwarming stories too."

ecognised religious marriage would one day be avail-ble to same-sex couples.
