

BSocSc Social Anthropology

What you will study

This document gives you a flavour of what you might study as part of a Social Anthropology at Manchester.

Each year of your degree you need to take units that add up to 120 credits.

Each unit is made up of 10 or 20 credits. This reflects the amount of work involved, so for every one credit you should do approximately 10 hours of work (eg lectures, tutorials, office hours and independent study).

Each of the course units below has **pre-requisites – other course units which you need to have taken the year before**. You can find information about these by clicking on the particular course unit information pages.

The actual units taught will depend on the availability of staff.

Year 1

In your first year you will take 120 credits overall.

Six course units are compulsory (100 out of 120 credits):

Regional Studies of Culture: 1	20
Regional Studies of Culture: 2	20

You can then choose your remaining 20 units from the following Anthropology courses:

Course unit	Credits
Introduction to Business Anthropology: Consumers, Companies and Culture	20
Digital Film-Making	20

You can choose 20 credits of courses from outside Social Anthropology. This means that you can choose things such as a Language through the LEAP scheme (Language Experience for All Programmes).

Year 2

In your second year you will take 120 credits overall.

In your second year you will have 2 compulsory course units:
